And we're off! The new Fall leagues are off and running. It is always fun to start fall leagues, the excitement of a fresh start, new goals, seeing old friends and of course old foes.

Starting the season with a positive attitude and trying to stay positive through out the year can be a challenge at times. Understanding that some bowlers are in it to win it, while others are there for the beer and camaraderie can be difficult. How can we all possible get along?

Starting on the right league could be the answer to these questions. If you are a bowler who has the desire to win money and be competitive, you may want to look for a league that has higher average bowlers that bowl head to head, like 12 Grand at KingPins or Mt Hood Commercial at Mt. Hood Lanes. Most bowling centers have these compet-

itive leagues. The bowling fees for these leagues tend to be higher but the prize fund is much higher as well. Another option for the more competitive bowler would be the Traveling Leagues. There are several Traveling Leagues in the Greater Portland area. Traveling leagues bowl at a different center each week.

"Fun leagues", as they are referred to, are leagues that have a mix of all averages and abilities. Generally these are Mixed Leagues. Most bowling centers have these leagues set up through out the week and even on the weekends. These leagues generally cost less to bowl and have smaller prize funds at the end of the season. Mixed leagues are great leagues for friends and family to join and enjoy being together and get a little exercise. Bowlers of all ages (18-100) and skill level bowl in these leagues, handicap is used

to help even the playing field between the teams.

Senior leagues are leagues with age requirements, generally 55 and over. Most Senior leagues bowl during the day, Monday through Friday. Bowling fees are a bit lower. Don't be fooled by the term "Senior", some of these bowlers average in the 200 range and can take you to school on the lanes. There are a couple leagues that are all women, such as Accidentals at KingPins or Sunset Senior Men at Sunset Lanes which are all

Keeping it fun and maintaining a positive attitude will make bowling leagues enjoyable for everyone. Consider the composition of the league and adjust your attitude accordingly. Most importantly BE KIND!

USBC recognizes the big achievements like bowling your first 300 game or first 800 series. Most of the awards bowlers receive through out the season are provided by our local association GPUSBC. Funding for awards come from the local bowling fees.

Each year the GPUSBC
Awards Committee attempts to select awards that bowlers will enjoy receiving. We try to change it up while keeping the cost under consideration. The committee is always open to suggestions. Feel free to send us an email if you have an idea you would like us to evaluate.

Make sure your secretary is informed when you are eligible for special awards. They won't be able to see a clean game or split conversion from the recap sheet.

Generally awards are distributed to the league secretary within 30 days of earning the award. GPUSBC has strict guidelines for awards but we rely on league secretaries to submit the required documentation in a timely manner.

If you believe you are eligible for an award and haven't received it, contact your secretary to investigate why you haven't received it.

members.





It has come to my attention that some leagues are not turning in awards that may be previously earned. PLEASE turn them in. These awards are used not only to get the award but in the following ways:

- The bowler can track their history and take pride in everything they have done.
- Team captains can use this information when putting together teams for tournaments
- 3. The Hall of Fame needs the scores to be recorded so that when a bowler is nominated for the Hall of Fame they have enough points to be inducted. The Superior Performance Award is based on points for 300 games, 800 series, tournament participation, etc.

So as you can see, recording awards is not just for the award but for many other uses.

Please help me to ensure that every bowler is recognized by turning in every award.
